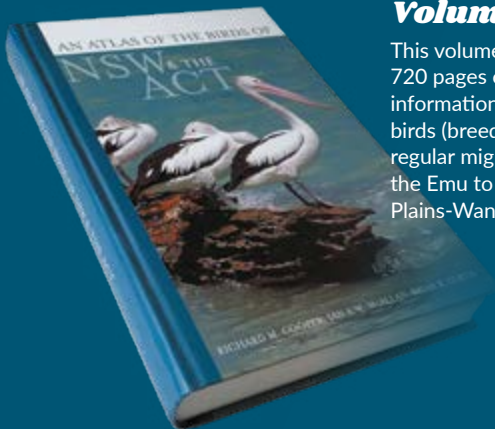

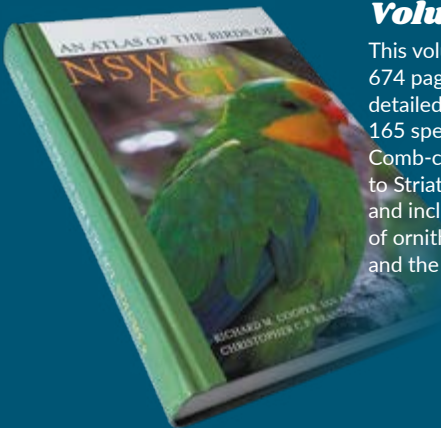

Volume 1

This volume contains 720 pages of detailed information on 183 birds (breeding and/or regular migrants) from the Emu to the Plains-Wanderer.



Volume 2

This volume comprising 674 pages presents detailed information on 165 species from the Comb-crested Jacana to Striated Pardalote and includes a history of ornithology in NSW and the ACT.



Volume 3

This volume contains 776 pages and covers resident and migrant species from the Eastern Spinebill to the Common Greenfinch plus notes on recently listed species, endemic Lord Howe Island birds, all known vagrant species and a listing of unconfirmed species.
